TVIH Board Meeting October 27th, 2021

New PowerPoint Presentation for Outreach- Marie Grunwell, Fran Dummett

Diane Minor and Yaa Ampofo have amended our PowerPoint used to attract and inform new members to make it more applicable to businesses. They have amended the logo and slogan for TVIH as well. The PowerPoint includes fees as well as the benefits of joining TVIH.

Website Committee Update – Fran Dummett

The committee is concentrating on the home page and incorporating the new logo and motto. They are evaluating other Village websites to determine suggestions for changing the TVIH Website. TVIH will stay with Club Express for the redesign. Pete Brunner submitted a grant to Howard County Community services that could help assist with the cost of revamping the website.

Financial Report & 2022 Budget – Pete Brunner

The Information Technology agenda now includes Web Development. We have requested funding from the County's Community Services Partnership Program to cover this expense (as well as some other related costs). If we are approved, we may not need further funding. Pete has identified several potential grantors and we will also need to work with Outreach to target business donors. Other committee budgets have been fully adopted based on funding requested from Committee chairs.

It is extremely important that the Board begin a discussion of future funding requirements as well as strategies to fully fund TVIH's ongoing operations. We expect income will fall short of expenditures in 2022. TVIH will be ending 2021 in strong financial condition so 2022 will not be a problem. However, we cannot sustain a budget deficit indefinitely. The Strategic Planning committee on funding will need to focus on long-term approaches to bringing income in line with expenses. We will need to look at membership dues (which are low compared with most Villages) as well as our special events, and annual fund drives. We will likely need to re-examine how we try to raise funds from the local business community. We need to consider 2022 as a year in which we repair the damage done to our fundraising abilities during the pandemic.

Nominating Committee Report & Elections – Sarah Spence

Three Villagers were nominated for the three vacant Board Positions – Cathy Latham, Harry Glass, and Fran Lorenzi. Jim Bouscaren was nominated to replace Mary Pat Donelan as Tri –Director for operations. Resumes have been received and reviewed by the Board with a final vote at the November meeting and elected members will join the Board at its December meeting.

Purchase of Chairs for Office – Marie Grunwell

After comparing the features and prices of office chairs at PVI vs Amazon vs Staples, the Board decided that they would purchase 3 chairs from Amazon which offered the best buy.

Holiday Party—December 18th – 3:00 to 5:30 PM – Joy Cheung

TVIH will contribute \$150 to purchase sandwiches, vegetable garnish, desserts and beverages .The cost per person will be \$5. Registration deadline is 12/5. Individuals must register but will pay at the door. Registration will be limited to those with vaccinations. Because site capacity is limited to 35, there will be seatings at 2 and 3:30pm. The seating arrangements will be 2 tables in the front room and one in the back room. Those who prefer to eat outside can take their food and chair outside.

Annual Meeting

The logistics of the virtual January meeting will be planned by the Executive Committee.

One fee covers anyone who enrolls from the Village. Coordination of requests should go through Pete Brunner and Yaa Ampofo. The website committee, Sarah Ziemann, Joy Cheung as well as the entire TVIH membership will be informed of this opportunity to increase their knowledge.

Committee Reports:

Communications/Outreach - Mary McGraw

Diane Minor is doing a presentation at Ellicott City Senior Center. Mary McGraw plans to take the new TVIH slideshow and reach out to various businesses.

Program Committee - Sharon Neville

The committee is attempting to offer in- person events in addition to current in-person happy hours, lunch bunch and Mah Jong. Members have suggested a program on crafts (Note the upcoming mosaic workshop). Pete Brunner attended the Commission on Aging, Howard County and learned it is in the process of submitting its age friendly Howard plan to AARP in the next couple of weeks. Terry Hanson will be the county coordinator. Perhaps Sharon could reach out to him to have a presentation on the plan and other activities.

Membership Committee & Pods – Kim Sherman & Karol Hess

There are 150 associate members and 24 full members. These 174 members are drawn from 133 households. The members on the committee are working on making sure buddy assignments are working.

By-Laws Committee -Ellin Scholnick

Elizabeth Johnson, Karen Michaelson and Ellin Scholnick have a first draft of a revision of the bylaws.

New Business

There is concern about record keeping on our ways of operating because TVIH lacks a singular area where all the information about operations is held. Fran and Yaa have begun work on streamlining processes using Board minutes as a source of information. Every committee should have written procedures on how it works and what it does.

TVIH's Draft 2022 Budget— Membership Fees to Stay at Current Level

Director of Finance, Pete Brunner, presented the draft 2022 Village budget to the Board of Directors at its October meeting. The Board is reviewing the budget and will vote on it at the November meeting.

The Board is aware that many of our members experienced financial concerns during the pandemic. Accordingly, the Board voted to freeze member dues for 2022 at current levels.

In 2020 and 2021, Village finances took a significant hit to our on-going fund sources. But TVIH was fortunate to qualify for emergency funding from Federal, State and County as well as local grantor sources. Some of these funds enabled TVIH to assist some of our members needing help during this crisis.

The availability of emergency funds (which will be unavailable in 2022) gives us a small cushion as we work to restore funding streams such as grants, support from local businesses and fund-raising programs such as a 50-50 Raffle, Bingo, and possibly other efforts.

Spotlight our Service Volunteers

Jim Bouscaren

Jim has been a TVIH member and transportation volunteer since 2018. His easy-going nature and willingness to help is often noted by others. Jim never objects to accepting a long drive and was one of a handful of drivers who continued to provide rides during COVID. When thanked by our



coordinators, Jim frequently remarks on how interesting our members are and how he enjoys their chats. Jim's passions are his family, biking, and old cars. He is also a member of the IT Team and Board of Directors. Thank you, Jim, for all the miles and smiles.

The Fundraising Committee Needs Your Help

The Fundraising Committee is responsible for raising 60 percent of the entire budget for The Village In Howard. The Committee does this by running programs such as the 50-50 Raffle, Bingo, Restaurant Nights, and the annual appeal. We need more help from members.

"Undesign the Redline" Exhibit: Understanding More About Racism

This interactive exhibit led by a guide, helps to explain why a federal housing act of the mid 1930's contributed significantly to systemic racism by establishing legal guidelines for who was able to obtain mortgages and purchase homes in specific neighborhoods. While repealed several years ago, the racial discrimination shaped the demographic and wealth patterns of American communities. The exhibit has been in dozens of major U.S. cities and is returning to Howard County again.

What to Do If Your Older Loved One Needs More Than Long-Distance Caregiving

If you're like many other people in the world, you've recently realized that your mother, father, or other senior loved one needs more attention and care than they are currently receiving. And if you don't live in the same area as them, your family has some decisions to make.

Should you move closer to your loved one, or maybe even move in with them? Should they move closer to you? Would your loved one thrive more in a senior living community or assisted living facility? Below, The Village in Howard covers these questions and more.

Talk With Your Loved One

If you feel that it's time for your loved one to have a family member nearby, the first thing you should do is talk to your loved one. Go over all of their options to see what they want to do. For example, ask them if they would be willing to move closer to you; don't be surprised if they balk because many seniors are not crazy about the idea of such a major change. Even if it is for family, starting over in a new place as an older adult is hard. However, if they are open to the possibility of moving closer to you, you can research and go over all the possibilities.

For instance, if your loved one does not need extensive medical care, they might enjoy living in a community like The Village in Howard. If your loved one does need 24/7 attention and care, they might be best served by moving into an assisted living facility or nursing home. Another option is to help your loved one downsize to a smaller home in your area.

Consider Renting

If you end up moving to the area in which your loved one lives, don't feel like you have to buy a home. There are actually many benefits to renting an apartment, condo, or another small home. For instance, you won't have to deal with some of the stress that comes with a big relocation, and renting will give you some time to prepare for purchasing a home (if that's what your goal is).

If your loved one lives in Columbia, MD, you could either move to Columbia yourself or to a nearby area like Alexandria, VA. This would still put you within a close distance to your loved one while also giving you a little bit of your own space. And there are endless living possibilities in Alexandria and surrounding areas!

Look Out for the Signs

If you have a suspicion that your loved one needs more attention and care but are not confident enough in



your assessment to make big decisions going forward, learn some of the signs that you can watch for. If your loved one is not able to keep up with their self-care and hygiene routine, or if they are exhibiting signs of memory loss, that is usually a clear indicator that more care is needed.

Also, if you are worried that your loved one is unsafe in their current living environment, you should consider taking some steps toward getting them more attention and care. Significant weight loss, increased isolation, mood swings, limited mobility, and serious health conditions are also signs to look for.

Remember the Challenges of Long-Distance Caregiving

There may be days when it seems like your aging loved one is just fine. But it is essential that you don't forget the signs of trouble you have previously noticed. It's also important to remember how difficult it is to care for your loved one from a long distance. Being a caregiver is stressful on good days, but when you are an hour or more from your loved one, it can make it nearly impossible to manage their care, not to mention the stress that comes with your responsibilities.

If there is an older adult in your life that needs more attention and care than they are currently receiving, it's essential for your family to start making moves. Remember to have a conversation with your loved one, and look into all of your living possibilities. By taking steps to close the distance between you and your loved one, everyone will benefit.
